Treasure the Measures: Evaluating OD

In December we ran a national Do OD event focused on evaluating OD. Treasure the Measures was a fun and informative day. We had a room full of energetic people who threw themselves into the topic, using a variety of tools and methods to help evaluate their practice. Evaluations of the day itself were very interesting. 96 per cent of participants said that the event met its objectives and 100 per cent said that they felt more confident and capable as a result of attending.
